KINDERGARTEN STUDY: Full-Day versus Half-Day Kindergarten

6 Children attending full-day kindergarten programs not only had “higher scores on math and reading achievement tests” but also had “greater language abilities” (Lynch, 2005) 7 Beyond these differences in literacy and math learning and in language development, children attending full-day kindergarten spend more instructional

Reading to Young Children: A Head-Start in Life

Reading to children at age 4-5 every day has a significant positive effect on their reading skills and cognitive skills (ie, language and literacy, numeracy and cognition) later in life o Reading to children 3-5 days per week (compared to 2 or less) has the same effect on the child’s reading skills at age 4-5 as being six months older
