Laryngeal and Tracheobronchial Stenosis

Edinburgh surgeon William MacEwen in 1878 was the first to perform tracheal intubation via an orotracheal route prior to surgery to resect an oral tumor Seven years later, the American Joseph O'Dwyer developed a metal orotracheal tube that he used in patients with diphtheria and laryngeal stenosis secondary to syphilis and burns⁸ In 1888
